
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"Welcome to the April 2023 Edition of the AMWS E-News" - Chairman, Mr David **Parmeter** "In this welcoming message I want to reach out to



Rear Admiral Smith, the guest speaker at the event, observed the 58th annual commemoration coincided with the 80th anniversary of the sinking of the 2/3 Australian hospital ship Centaur during World War II. The ship was torpedoed on 14 May 1943. Of the 332 people on board, only 64 survived the attack. Rear Admiral Smith said many merchant seamen joined the navy during the war, wearing naval uniforms and serving on naval ships under the white ensign while the royal navy experienced a shortage of experienced seamen. "Merchantmen suffered the greatest percentage of deaths of any service during the second world war, but the number of the Australian merchant mariners killed during conflict is difficult to estimate," he said. "Over 70 years of peace, liberty, and our material wealth are owed to those gallant merchant navy sailors. "It is our duty to ensure that their great sacrifice continues to be remembered and honoured. And we will remember them. Lest

ISWAN provides 24/7 confidential helpline services for seafarers and their families worldwide, and in 2022 alone, the organization assisted over 13,600 individuals from 94 different nationalities through more than 16,000 calls and messages. The number of Ukrainian seafarers and their families seeking help from ISWAN's helplines increased by 674% due to the impact of the war in Ukraine. COVID-19 pandemic, and Typhoon Rai in the Philippines, also resulted in a rise in contacts relating to financial difficulties. In addition, ISWAN observed a significant increase in reports of abuse, bullying, harassment, and

discrimination.

Port Ash, Ship Handling and Research Centre, Twelve Mile Creek, NSW

Located on the east coast of Australia, approximately 2 hours north of Sydney, New South Wales, Port Ash Australia serves as a training center for ship handling. The center specializes in providing practical training to ship's Masters, Officers, Marine Pilots, and Naval Officers in controlling ships at low speeds in open, confined, and shallow waters with or without tug assistance. Port Ash employs experienced Marine Pilots as instructors and utilizes manned

ship models to facilitate hands-on training on its purpose-built 2-hectare (5acre) lake. The lake has been constructed at a 25:1 scale and features deep and shallow water areas that mimic the depths of water when approaching a typical harbor environment. Approximately one-third of the lake is dedicated to deep water (at a 50-meter

scale depth), another third to medium depth (at a 25-meter scale depth), and the remaining third to shallow water areas (at a 14-meter scale depth). **Interested? Learn more here >>**
